Virtual GO Czech History + Theatre

January 3 – January 21 via ZOOM

Reflection Course during the first 7 weeks of spring semester

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Description: This is a combined virtual GO experience and reflection course which will meet during the winter of 2022. Virtual experiences should have intentional reflection throughout the experience and then shortly after for students to be able to process the cultural interactions, and their own culture. This course involves a variety of graded components that depend on consistent attendance and full participation in all course meetings and activities. Guided reflection tasks on the Virtual experience will demonstrate the ways in which students have progressed on the course learning goals.

Cross-Cultural Learning Goals: Students complete a Cross-Cultural experience that contains preparatory, experiential, and reflective components that enables them to:

- 1. Demonstrate a complex understanding of culture including the ability to
 - a. Develop a critical working definition of culture.
 - b. Articulate awareness of differences and similarities between their culture of origin and the one in which they are/were immersed.

- c. Define and recognize ethnocentrism and ethnocentric assumptions.
- d. Demonstrate critical awareness of their own cultural values and identity.
- 2. Recognize how their attitudes, behaviors, and choices affect the quality of their cross-cultural experiences.
- 3. Reflect on their personal growth, social responsibility, and the value of active participation in human society.
